



Innovation Labs at Valley Stream UFSD 13 Unlock Children's Imaginations

Innovation Labs are now set up at every school in the Valley Stream UFSD 13. These spaces offer students an opportunity to explore their creativity and ingenuity with state-of-the-art learning tools in a free-flowing, less-structured environment. Innovation Labs can lead students to create almost anything; at Wheeler Avenue Elementary School, for example, students worked with various programs to create a robot that can drive and make turns. Technology that was solely the stuff of science fiction a generation ago is now possible in our third grade classrooms.

Science, Technology, Engineering and Math, or STEM, subjects are such an integral part of a public school curriculum, from kindergarten right up to senior year. Innovation Labs help Valley Stream UFSD 13 educators to make the possibilities of STEM instruction nearly endless.

Innovation Labs are just one component of Valley Stream UFSD 13's commitment to using emerging technology to augment and enhance instruction. Other initiatives include the expansion of personal laptops to all Valley Stream UFSD 13 students in kindergarten and first grade; a dedicated district app for smart phones; and the use of programs such as Wakelet, Gimkit, Google and Flipgrid. At Willow Road Elementary, students used the social learning platform Flipgrid during class to create and record video to set up their own escape room for a presentation on the life of 19th century Haitian general and president, Sylvain Salnave. Another group of students coded with Metaverse, a learning tool that used augmented reality, to create a presentation on Bessie Coleman, the first African-American woman to hold a pilot's license.





With schools nationwide now relying on digital instruction during the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, a proficiency and comfortability with technology and remote learning tools are more vital than ever. The Valley Stream UFSD 13 believes that the implementation of technology in the classrooms is something that will greatly assist students as they progress through their educational careers.


Our school buildings may be closed for the time being, but your district will continue to be focused on providing the highest levels of service for our students and families in meeting both educational and social/emotional needs.

LEARNING DURING COVID-19 PANDEMIC

As of the writing of this newsletter, schools in New York are closed indefinitely. The District Administration and the Board of Education would like to assure the community of Valley Stream UFSD 13 that state-mandated school closures do not mean learning has stopped. Until schools reopen, students should participate in remote learning by accessing and completing instruction as provided by their individual teachers. Parents can email their students' teachers if they have any questions. Teachers will be available to support student learning during the regularly scheduled days and regularly scheduled school hours. Teachers will respond during this time and using the same methods as they had been doing throughout the year. The expectations for students is that they should complete all assigned work to the best of their abilities.

HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS VISIT WHEELER FOR A LESSON IN SPORTSMANSHIP



As part of the Athletes Helping Athletes (AHA) program, high school student-athletes visited Wheeler Avenue School students to teach them



about what to expect in middle school and high school. AHA comprises a series of three workshops. During the most recent visit, the student-athletes focused on the importance of civility and how these behaviors relate to sportsmanship on and off the field. They also used their personal experiences and problem-solving scenarios to highlight and discuss the positive choices while combating negative behaviors such as bullying and teasing. At the end of the session, Wheeler Avenue students in the class were given an opportunity to ask the high schoolers questions. The athletes serve as positive mentors and role models to the younger students.
